St. Pierre, on his last trip from the French Islands, reported that the fishermen and merchants at that place were greatly exicted over the discovery of a new method of obtaining fresh bait on the Grand Banks which, if success ful, will completely revolutionize the cod-Presbytery I censed Mr. McLeod as a fishing business. Instead of coming direet to St. Pierre as usual and buying bait at \$2 to \$3 a barrel, or losing a couple of

Augmentation, Sabbath Schools, System- These baskets were sunk in 70 to 80 fathoms of water and in a few hours filled with peri-winkles. One dory would catch enough of these peri-winkles in a day to bait all the trawls. They were taken on board, cracked open, and the live shell fish, two or three inches long, baited on the hooks. The cod took this bait ravenously, and in a very short time the three vessels sailed into St. Pierre, loaded down to the gunwales with fish caught on their way out. There arrival produced a great sensation there, especially as many of the vessels had only caught a few hundred quintals although Fowlie and W. S.
