

The average of education is very high. There is no census of illiterates, and I heard of none. Last year nearly 85,000 children were in the free schools, with some 2,000 teachers; every denomination has its colleges. The cost of good living is certainly not more than half what it is in Brooklyn (where I "stay" at present), the chief saving being in rent, fuel, fish, potatoes and small fruits. 
