Mr. Tom. Williston as a Malpeque Oysterman.

[Montreal Witness]
The oyster industry has in the past few years developed into one of the larges industries of Prince Edward Island. A new departure has been made in the way of bringing the celebrated Malpeques to Montreal by way of the St. Lawrence. Thomas Williston, of Miramichi, has arrived at Jacques Cartier wharf with a barge containing 900 barrels, and in a day or two has sold 400. He says this is the first time this kind has been brought up by river. At present, dealers are payin g \$3.75 a barrel for Malpeques delivered by rail through the states. They can now buy the same oyster from \$2 and slightly upwards. The resturant keepers, who retail the oysters at twenty-five cents a dozen, are the largest buyers.

Today a Witness reporter dropped into the "saloon" of the barge and there had an interesting chat with Mr. Williston, on this juicy subject.

"Yes," said the barge owner, I have been in the business a good many years and I can tell you that this has been the best season for oysters within my recollection."

"How do you account for that?" "Well, it is attributed to the mile winter of last year and this, and also to the warm season.

"Where do you pick your oysters?" said the unsophisticated newspaper man. "Malpeque Bay, of course! Yes, it is on Prince Edward Island and is about thirty miles long."

"Busy down there now, I suppose?" "Well, I guess so. Why, there are about 700 men picking oysters the whole

"Hard work getting them?" "I should say so. It is the hardest work on earth. Why, they have to be fished out of about twenty feet of water. But they are very thick this year and can be more readily picked. We have winged rakes, you know, with which we bring them up."

"Ready demand, I suppose?" "Yes, there are dealers around all the time from every part of the states, who buy them up as soon as they are fished. "Have you to pay for the right of "No, my dear fellow, you have the

same right that I have. The bed is free "Do you export any to England?"

"I used to, but I lost money on the experiment. They have the finest oysters in the world there-the "Natives." "How many barrels can a man fish in a

"Five. But I've seen them so scarce that it took a whole day to fish a single barrel. That was after a windy season. I have often wondered they keep so thick they are so carefully picked. I am taking down some new species to plant

Mr. Williston stated that since he had come up he found the demand for clams very great. "And," said he, "I threw barrels overboard before I came up simply because I thought there was no market for them.'




