Refusing to aid Officers.

When the arrests of the young men, McGinnis and Bernard were being effected on Tuesday evening of last week the crowd pressed in upon the officers and rather encouraged the prisoners in their struggles to escape. These bystanders and interested spectators are generally in sympathy with offenders-there being a few exceptions of course-and their presence is sure to have the effect of promoting resistance. In the cases referred to it was especially noticeable that while the prisoner, Bernard was resisting officer Gillis, the crowd was so dense about them as to interfere with their movements, But when the sheriff was asked by several law-abiding citizens to exercise his authority for the preservation of the peace, and he called upon men in the crowd to assist the officers, those who had been nearest and apparently much interested in the melee, seemed to be the most anxious to get out of the way. It was, therefore, clear that those persous were there either out of curiosity that was not very creditable to them, or were only awaiting a favorable opportunity to assist the prisoner in making his escape. And it, thus, happened that of nearly a dozen persons called upon to assist only one or two responded, one on the roll of honor being Mr. Anthony Forrest, who rendered good service to the sheriff

reciprocate, by assisting to maintain law and order in the common interest, when called upon to do so. The magistrate made it quite clear to those who were brought before him on Friday, that, in the first place, persons who crowd around officers when an arrest is being made render themselves liable to prosecution, while the neglect of any male person between the ages of sixteen

and sixty to assist in making arrests or in otherwise preserving the peace when called upon by peace officers, constitutes a grave offence. In some of the cases referred to there was a commutation of the fines, but, hereafter, those who hover about the spot where arrests are being made will, probably, have to pay for their entertainment unless they do so with the intention of helping the policemen, if necessary. Another thing that seems to be suscep-

tible of a change in the way of improvement, is the mistaken leniency of officers towards the kicking, striking and butting class of rowdies, whom it is necessary to arrest. Such characters should be made to understand that when a policeman (lays hands upon them it is better for unnecessary harshness or force employed. prisoner strikes or clutches at the officer. the striking arm or clutching fingers, and if the prisoner kicks, a few well directed bystanders who usually crowd around policeman when they are making arrests, many of them deserve but little consideration. They should be warned to keep a reasonable distance away and punished if they do not obey, If some of our toughs and their sympathisers had their kind in the larger cities, they would | way.
