The Chatham Social Club Case.

CONVICTION BECAUSE THE CLUB'S BY-LAWS BUSINESS, ELECTING MEMBERS AND HOLDING ITS REGULAR MEETINGS.

The case against the steward of the Chatham Social Club has ended in a conviction. A great deal of evidence was taken, able counsel were engaged, and the Magistrate took occasion to consult leading counsel in Fredericton. The club has been in existence about two years, and this is the first charge that has been laid against it. The quiet and orderly manner in which it has been conducted, as well as the fact that it had been formed under legal advice and was supposed to be a hard subject to tackle, combined to keep it from being molested. No drunken men ever staggered from its door, no disturbance was ever raised in its rooms, no laborers spent the money there which their families needed for food and clothing. Liquor was sold only to members and their guests, and the prosecution failed, after raking the town for evidence, to prove the sale of a single glass to any one was not on the roll of membership. members was conducted in a free and ceremony that was taking place.
