Has the Baby Red Eyes.

[Albany Express.] What may strike the average citizen as curious law went into effect recently. It is chapter 41 of the Session laws of 1890, entitled "an act for the prevention of blind-

ness." It provides as follows :-Section 1 Should any midwife or nurse having charge of an infant in this State notice that one or both eyes are much inflamed or reddened at any time within two weeks after its birth, it shall be the duty of such midwife or nurse so having charge of such infant to report the fact in writing within six hours to the Helath Officer or some legally qualified practitioner of medicine of the city, town or district in which the parents reside. SEC. 2. Any failure to comply with the provisions of this act shall be punished by a

ine not to exceed \$100, or imprisonment not to exceed six months, or both SEC. 3. This act shall take effect on the 1st day of September, 1890.
