



The Legitimate Result.

The McKinley tariff bill, which has passed the United States House of Representatives and, as we write, is before the Senate, is a rejoinder to the Dominion tariff policy. Some of our tariff-makers were very brave in Ottawa when they were inducing parliament to place heavy duties on articles imported largely by Canadians from the United States and blustered about compulsion towards reciprocity in trade, the germs of which, they intimated, were contained in their new tariff principles. One of the most remarkable water powers in the world is that utilized in the working of the famous Comstock mine in Nevada. It is thus described: "A ten-foot water-wheel receives the water from Mount Davidson through a pipe line at a head of 460 feet giving 200 horsepower. The water is again caught up delivered into two large iron pipes and sent down the shaft of the Chollar mine in the Sutro tunnel level, where it is received by six wheels at a head of 1,080 feet, an aggregate of 750 horse-power being developed. 
