SALTING.

It may then be salted in the churn or removed to the butter worker for that ourpose. Pure salt of fine velvety grain only should be used. The rate of salting should be regulated to suit the taste and requirements of the customers. From three-quarters of an ounce to one ounce per pound will be found most acceptable. The preparation for the arket should be made with a view of giving the butter an attractive appearance, whether it be packed in tubs or firkins, or finished in prints or rolls.
