THE GREAT STUMPAGE DEBATE!

FREDERICTON, March 18.—Mr. Burchill made his inquiry regarding Johnson's bridge. At Mr. Blair's request, owing to Chief Commissioner Ryan's illness, the mover was willing that Mr. Burchill should stand for the resolution.

Mr. Hattington moved his resolution for a statement of all amounts paid, balances in banks, etc. Hon. Mr. Ritchie moved his resolution that the information should be given without an address.

Mr. Stevens moved his resolution providing that the departmental reports should be supplied to members and papers before the meeting of the legislature.

Hon. Mr. Blair said that while he did not think the motion would accomplish any good results, yet he had no objection to the passage of the motion. The motion was adopted.

Hon. Mr. Blair moved his resolution favoring the reduction of stumpage from \$1.50 to \$1.25, and supported his motion in a speech of an hour and a half. The resolution, he said, was based, in the first place, upon the principle that if the finances of the country would permit there should be some remission in the tax, and it would be for the house to say whether that was a principle to which they were ready to give their assent.

He pointed out the many reasons which had so often advanced why the stumpage dues should be reduced.

From 1883 down to the present the government had been repeatedly and most strenuously urged by the northern representatives and by delegations from that quarter on behalf of the lumbermen, to make some concession and place the stumpage tax on what they claimed would be a more equitable footing as compared with the operations in the south. Those appeals the government had not been able to yield to.

But it did not follow from the fact, that the time was never to come when the demands should be met. It did not follow that because the government was unable to make a reduction in 1884, or 1885, or 1886, that they would be unable to do so in 1889.

The government had at all times and in all places given the people of the north to understand that they sympathized heartily with the strength of their claim, and that they would like to make some concession, but that with the limited revenue at their command and the great claims upon the treasury they could not see their way clear to do so.

Hon. Mr. Blair said that in 1889 he and other members of the government had been in communication with gentlemen on the North Shore with a view to arriving at some basis by which this grievance could be removed.

But the gentlemen so spoken to were not willing to concur in the offers made by the government. They wanted a greater reduction than the government was willing to give. Therefore the negotiations fell through. He denied emphatically that the government had waited until after the elections before they had sought to meet the expectations of the people of the north. But matters had remained in statu quo until the elections took place in January, and arrangements were arrived at by which his honorable friend from Northumberland, Mr. Tweedie, took a seat in the government.

Mr. Blair then proceeded to show why it was that the condition of the finances of the province would not admit of a reduction being made. Hon. members would see that the territorial revenue for 1889 amounted to nearly \$150,000. During the lumber season, now he estimated, the crown land department had received information which showed that the lumber cut for this year would be many millions in excess of that of last year. That information was to the effect that at the rate of \$1 per M the territorial revenue from all sources would amount to \$138,000 or \$140,000 for the current year. This sum would enable the government to make large appropriations for all the great public services, for schools, for roads and bridges, etc., as they had hitherto made.

AS TO THE CHARGE OF INCONSISTENCY on this question, Mr. Blair challenged any gentleman on the floors of the government, had announced that the government would be unwilling to meet the wishes of the people of the North Shore they ought to do so.
