THEIR DISCHARGE FROM BANKRUPTCY SUS PENDED FOR FIVE YEARS. Judgment in the case of R. A. & J Stewart, was delivered in London on June 21st, by Registrar Linklater, suspending their discharge from bankruptcy for five years from July 1889, the date of their application. The registrar found that while the charges of fraud preferred by the bank, Barclay Bevan & Co., or the New Brunswick Trading Co., were not proved, that the debtors were guilty of rash and hazardous speculations, of trading after they knew they were insolvent and of granting an undue preference. It transpired that the bankrupts were insolvent as far back as 1885.

Registrar Linklater's judgment occupied over two hours in delivery. In his concluding remarks he said: The effect of the course of trading

adopted by the bankrupts had been dis astrous to the creditors, as they would only receive a dividend of a fraction over 3d. in the pound on a very large indebted. ness; and that course of trading had, in his opinion, been utterly reckless and unjustifiable. Although the act gave him the power to do so, he did not think he should be exercising his discretion wisely by wholly refusing the order of discharge. He preferred, as a general rule, to retain the extreme penalty for the worst of offenses, such as fraud, and he saw no reason to depart from that rule in the present case, and he did not intend to give the bankrupts their discharge coupled with a condition affecting their after acquired property. In the first place, the amount of indebtedness was too large; and, secondly, he did not believe that any such order would tend to the pecuniary advantage of the creditors in this English bankruptcy, having regard to the probable field of the bankrupts' future commercial operations. He should therefore deal with the case by suspending the order of discharge. With regard to this there were certain matters which he thought he ought to consider to the bankrupts' advantage. The first was that the public examination was concluded in August, 1887, and they could then have made their application. The next was that several most serious charges of fraud was made against them, and days and days were occupied in considering them; and notwithstanding, all those charges failed, the mere fact that they were publicly made and persisted in must have most materially increased the difficulties and anxieties of the bankrupts in connection with this application and also added If bad feeling is not engendered between considerably to the expenses.
