The American Steam Laundry.

Messrs, Dick & Blair's American Steam Laundry, Chatham, is ready for work, and experienced visitors say it has no superiors in the maritime provinces. It is located at the corner of Dake and Wentworth Streets in Mr. Dick's large two-storey building, which is 60x30 feet and had, besides, an addition on the north end of Wentworth Street large enough to make a roomy boiler house. Persons who have not seen a good

steam laundry have but limited ideas of what such an e tablishment is and they wonder what it contains to make it cost some three thousand dollars. A visit to the American Steam Laundry soon explains the matter. Entering the boiler house one first sees a 30 h. p. boiler of the well-known "Monarch" form, patented and made by Messrs. Robb & Sons of Amherst, N. S., with its 60 ft. steel smokestack, made at the Miramichi Foundry and Machine Works, Chatham, from which came also the 15 h. p. hori. zontal engine, counter-shafting and pullevs, which drive the different machines and devices used in the work of the laundry. These latter, we may mention | ness of the throat and lungs, and for all are from the Crawford & Poland estab-

lishment, Boston. The washer, which supplies the place of the washtub in the household laundry, locks something like an exaggerated atent churn. It is a cylindrical machine ive feet long and of 40 inches diameter. It has pulley and belting attachment, with cog-wheels, steam and water-pipes and other devices not understood by the uninitiated. A portion of the side opens on substantial brass hinges, when released from spring bolts of the same material. Inside there is a big cylinder made of strong slats with a receptacle in it for the soiled clothes, which, before being thrown in, are placed in bags made of netting similar to that used for smelt-nets. This is to prevent wear of the clothes in washng. The impurities are extracted from the clothes by rotary reverse motion assisted by soap and water scientifically applied. This wash-tub stands next to the engine and weighs 850 lbs,-so it is a good, healthy tub.

Next, there is a device which looks a good deal like a large first-class standard compass such as is usually seen just forward of the wheel in ocean steamers. This is a centrifugal wringer. It is, in reality, a big tin-lined copper vessel with perforated sides, the velocity of which is six or seven hundred revolutions a minute. works on a vertical shaft and is enclosed in an outer vessel, into which the water extracted from the clothes by cetrifugal force is received and from which it passes

off into the drain-pipe. The collar and cuff starcher is a hal circular machine, capable of starching 250 or 300 pieces in three minutes. The articles are thrown in, and starched by an oscilating motion. The starch kettle is of tinned copper about half the size of a farmers' boiler but gracefully mounted on

three neat upright legs. The collar and cuff shaper is on th principal of iron workers' rollers, but is, of course a more highly finished and finer device. It is to give regular curves and shapes to collars and cuffs. There is also a dampening machine, which is used to moisten a streak along the line where collars are turned down so that the usual cracking of collars, under repeated turn-

Next is the ironer for the bosoms of shirts and the neck and wrist-band ironer. Also a combined shirt, collar and cuff

A Handy Boat.

Mr. J. M. Ruddock is putting the finishing touches on the motive power of Messrs. A. & R. Loggie's handy steamer Mary Odell. It is only a few weeks since the owners contracted with him for a new compound engine, air and circulating pump and condenser. The engine and pump are now in their places on board, and the condenser goes in right away. The engine's cylinders are 81 and 16 inches diameter respectively and the stroke is 8 inches. The first motion is of the bar link type. The air and circulating pump steam cylinder is 7 inches and its water and air cylinders 5 inches each. The surface condenser has 180 brass tubes. The steamer's boiler has been moved forward 21 feet, the forward cabin altered, a deck house built, the wheel house advanced a foot or two and the arrangements of the boat generally improved. Her appearance in her new dress of white paint, relieved by vermil lion lines and trimmings is smart and trim. Mr. Ruddock's steamboat work is fast gaining for him a high reputation and it is another evidence of Messrs Loggie's enterprise that they placed their work in such competent hands.

Farmers How's This?

The records at Chatham Railway Sta tion show that there were brought here last year 67 carloads of hay from Carleton County by the N. & W. road and 72 carloads from Westmorland and Albert counties. That was 1700 tons, valued as \$21,750. Be it remembered that this was only a part of the hay we imported, for it does not take account of any but full car loads. Large quantities additional came in mixed cars and much more came by schooners from Nova Scotia and P. E. I. Then, Newcastle received hundreds of tons by rail and schooners. Couldn't some of our farmers let unprofitable lumbering and fishing alone and raise more hay for the home market?
