Letter from the C. T. A. Inspector. Who sold the rum? Where did they get the firewater? These are the questions asked by the Chatham World of last week; and the Advocate of 13th inst., commenting, states that as there appears to be no officer to enforce the law they now sell liquor openly to all comers--white or brown.

I regret that the Advecate should make such a statement as the above until I refuse or neglect to prosecute violators of the C. T. A., after they furnish me with sufficient evidence to convict. It is true I have been had been seen going into and coming out of places where intoxicating liquors are said to be sold, and I have been asked to prosecute with such information, which I have refused to do, as I do not believe that the County would justify me in spending a thousand dollars of the ratepayers' money in that way. Now, sir, I have been attacked in the public press and otherwise for a dereliction of duty in not prosecuting offenders, and for seizing liquors and giving them up again, etc. To all such charges and complaints I, so far, have made no reply. One reason, is that I have neither wish nor the ability to become a newspaper correspondent, preferring to do my duty to the best of my ability, and render an account of my stewardship, at the proper time, to our Muncipal Council, to whom I consider myself responsible. would not now reply publicly to the Advocate's charge, only that persons throughout the County might, possibly, believe its state ment and withhold information that they would otherwise send to me. I wish, there fore, to state for the information of our temperance friends that I will go to any part of the County to investigate charges and proseente violators of the Canada Temperance Act if any reliable person will let me know of any person selling intoxicating liquors. The informant must give me their names, in confidence, and the witnesses must be reliable.

The date of sale must also be given. If such information is given and no action is taken by me, then it will be time enough to condemn me.
