Trouble in Cork.

CORK, Oct. 31.-The rival meetings 6 Parnellites and Anti-Parnellites last evening were separated by an enormous array of military and police, and disorder was thereby prevented. All the shops were closed except those of vendors of blackthorns. Mr. Dillon and Mr. O'Brien have left this city. The McCarthyite canvass is being conducted along the shore is six miles wide. Back of The priests have influenced many of the electors who are adherents of the opposing faction by telling them that they were not bound in consequence to keep the pledges that they had made to the Parnellites. Mr. Redmond is determined to continue the canvass until polling day. In a speech which he delivered at a meeting held here to-day, Mr. Redmond denied absolutely that the Parnellites had any intention whatever o retiring from the fight. The members of that party, he declared, would contest every vacancy in Parliament whenever there aplikely that O'Brien and Dillon woull retire first. The military were again called out this evening to preserve order and prevent any clashing between those present at meet-

ings of the two rival factions. Mr. John Deasy, member of Parliament for West Mayo, announced this evening that Mr. Michael Davitt was coming to this city on Monday next.

As showing the seriousness of the outbreaks here recently, it may be stated that no fewer than 325 cases were treated at different hospitals and infirmaries in this city during the riot. There were four cases treated on Sunday.

CORK, Nov. 1.- The Parnellite and anti-Parnellite meetings to-day were again divid ed by a large force of police. Nevertheless, the Parnellites managed to throw a good many stones over the heads of the police at Mr. O'Brien's meeting. The McCarthyites replied with similar missiles, and a serious conflict followed. The police were utterly unable to keep order. Many persons were injured in the scrimmage. 
