Tipper-phobia. If something very heavy would fall upon Sir Charles Tipper and annihilate him, a large number of newspapers would, no doubt, break out in rejoicings.

It is to be assumed that Sir Charles is not much more of a saint than other prominent politicians, but it seems reasonable to believe that he is not such an entirely bad man as the extreme party papers represent him to be.

It has been asserted and reiterated by these papers that he endeavored to buy the support of the Grand Trunk authorities for the conservatives in the late elections, while there is evidence on the other hand, that the Grand Trunk sought to secure certain advantages from the government, through Sir Charles, which he would not commit himself to.

The government had already done a great deal for the big railway corporation, whose managers seem to have become very jealous because even more was done for the Canadian Pacific.

The Grand Trunk, in revenge, and because it could not induce the government to commit itself to further grants for some of its new schemes, assumed a violently hostile attitude against the government, carrying Canadian voters from all points in the United States to their homes in the hope of securing its defeat.

Another sign of the interest taken in Sir Charles by the papers referred to, is his attitude towards him in connection with his leadership in Canada's behalf in the proposed reciprocity negotiations with Washington.

Advocates of reciprocity who have urged against them for doing all they did in the late election contest to give effect to their plans; but, having failed in their constitutional attempt in that direction and it being a settled fact that they are powerless to do anything whatever for the next four or five years to negotiate for reciprocity or anything else, is it not very ineffectual for them to so unfairly attack those who, being in a position of authority to speak for the country, are endeavoring, in good faith, to carry out the reciprocity pledges which were the great issue of the contest on the side of the winners?

Whatever Sir Charles Tipper's political opponents may say of him, the fact remains that he has no superior in ability, position and influence in Canada. The government desires to avail itself of his services in obtaining, if possible, the measure of reciprocity which every man in the country who is worthy of citizenship, wishes to have secured.

The Chatham Public Building.

We have excellent authority for saying that the pitching up of the old Dominion building now being effected, is about the last it will receive of the many attentions of that kind bestowed upon it since it passed into the Government's hands.

Mr. John E. Turnbull, Inspector of Dominion buildings, came here last Thursday to look after repairing the damage done by the late fire which consumed the Bancon corner, adjoining, and we understand that he is also to have some interior decoration done, such as the filling up of the cracks in the walls, which are the only new thing about the structure, papering the same over and painting some of the woodwork, etc.

It is assumed that he found things looking so badly that he reported upon their condition, and we are glad to know that orders have been received not to undertake other repairs which were contemplated, and it may be expected that a grant for a new public building in Chatham will be asked for when the estimates for the current year are laid before parliament at the session, which is to begin on 29th inst.

As we are, therefore, to have a new Dominion building for the Post Office, Custom House and other offices of the federal government, the question of site is one that will, no doubt, have a good deal of public attention. We have heard of quite a number that have been proposed. The present one is, of course, too small, but it is thought by those that the property adjoining, occupied by Mr. Mackenzie as a drug store, might be added to it and thus fill the bill.

The premises, including the old Cunard store and wharf, occupied by the N. B. Trading Company, is another site favored by many. The Ritchie wharf property has also its advocates. The Henderson property on Duke Street, bounded by Cunard Street and the lane running down at the rear of the present Custom House, is another proposed site, as is also the corner lot belonging to the same estate running from Cunard along Duke Street to Ullock's stables.

Another question of importance is the character of the building to be erected. The Public Works Department will commend itself to practical people if it entrusts the duty of designing the structure to an architect capable of realizing that the leading idea of its exterior form and finish must be in conformity with climatic and other conditions existing in this part of the country.

A good deal of Canadian money has been wasted by academic architects, who, lacking both Canadian experience and structural originality, have simply adapted designs from buildings in countries entirely different from ours, and, imagining they were erecting monuments to commemorate their own genius, have worse than wasted the money spent on their productions.

There is a Paris cable despatch of 2nd inst. to the New York Herald says: "In an interview to-day Mr. Mercier, the Canadian delegate, explained the object of his mission, which, he said, was intended to counteract the United States Tariff law. He aimed to re-organize the \$12,000,000 for the conversion of the interior lands and the development of railways and other resources. He would study the best sugar industry in Belgium and Germany, in order to apply the same system in the Dominion.

Package-Marks for the U. S.

One of the secretaries of the treasury at Washington has informed the secretary of state in regard to a question raised by the United States consul-general at Halifax, N. S., that the provisions of the tariff law in regard to marking goods and packages with the name of the manufacturer and goods produced in and shipped from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick to the United States are marked 'Nova Scotia' and 'New Brunswick' respectively, or 'Canada.'
