Sweden is one of the few civilized coun tries wherein criminals are beheaded. few weeks ago at Christianstad, for the first time in thirty years, a woman was beheaded for murder. Her name was Anna Mansdotter, and she had killed her sister-in-law. A primitive scaffold had been erected, and the executioner and his man (says the correspondent) are there clad in new military. looking uniforms, and wearing as a scarf-pin in his white silk tie a diminutive axe, just as a jockey might wear a horse-shoe or a little whip. It is his first execution, but he seems to have every confidence in his big axe, his muscles and his nerves. Just as the clock strikes eight the magistrate commences reading the judgment, and this done the doors are opened and Anna Mansdotter begins her last short walk. She is attired in a wide white gown with a belt round the waist, and there are still traces of beauty in her face. white and haggard though it is. She is 47 years old, but has still that straightness and one might almost say, ladylike carriage which is so often found among peasant women in Sweden. She seems comparatively calm, and the young chaplain who walks beside her is apparently more affected. Still the nervous twitching of her hands betrays her fear. Having ascended the scaffold, the chaplain said the Lord's Prayer and whispered to her words of encouragement. Anna Mansdotter then took her last look at this world, and laid herself down, slightly moaning as she did so. 

The Bay du Vin Wharf. The building of the proposed public wharf at Bay du Vin is to be let at public competition on Thursday next, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon at Mr. Malcolm Tavor's, at whose landing the structure is to be located, on a line with the present public road at that place. The main wharf will be 80 ft. long and 30 ft. wide, with an L, or approach, at the shore end 20 ft. long and 12 ft wide, making a total length of 100 feet. The shore end of the wharf is to rest on the bar and there is to be a depth of nine feet of water at low tide at the outer face. There are to be two slips in the wharf-one at either side, placed as directed by the inspector. The principal material will be hemlock logs of not less than 12 inches diameter at the small end, and the structure is to be protected with half-section spiling, cribbing, etc and to have four feet of good ballast properly levelled off and finished on top with gravel. There will also be the usual posts and suitable iron rings for mooring purposes. all properly placed and fastened. work is to be completed on or before June 1st. Plan and specification are to be seen on application to Mr. John Currie, Inspector.


