The Russian seals are indistinguishable

from our own and swim with them indiscriminately over a great part of the area within which marine sealing is prosecuted in Behring Sea. The Russian government has participated in the various abortive attempts made at an international regulation of the seal fishery, but has failed to lift a little finger in aid of Mr. Blaine's herculean efforts to regulate the fishery by his own authority and according to his own notions. This coldness of Russia, as the President perceives, must have a cooling effect upon Congress when the representatives of the peeple are invited to chalenge Great Britain to single combat largely in defence of Russian rights and interests.


