Mrs. McGuire and others was taken and the inquest adjourned to Friday evening next, Mrs. O'Brien testified that the man appeared to have been drinking or demented, as he looked strangely.

The body has been indentified as that of Alexander M. Liddell, a native of Glasgow. He was about 42 years old and came to Halifax over 20 years ago and was employed as a traveller with Burns & Murray. Subsequently he travelled for Montreal houses. He resided some time in Prince Edward Island, where he married a lady belonging to one of the best families, and with considerable means. About five years ago he returned to Halifax with his family and became book-keeper for J. P. Chetwynd. Mr. Liddell was a well known traveller and during the first five years he was on the road attained much success. But he was his own worst enemy, he could not resist the appetite for drink and frequently went on prolonged sprees. 
