



A Cardinal Sin.

"UP AND DOWN." We have heard of men whose temperament is such that it enables them to receive intelligence of the severest reverses of fortune, of the defeat of most cherished hopes, without even the movement of a muscle be-

traying how the news affects them. As huge misfortunes often stun with their shocks, and as pride is a great sustainer, we may believe such men do exist; but I have yet to find the stoic who can bear the petty injuries and grievances of everyday life without complaining. Such a character is more than mortal, and even when found I shall decline to believe in it until I have seen its behavior when kept waiting on a winter's night at Sleeford Junction-that junction so comfortless that the very trains themselves appear to keep away from it as long as they

The fast trains on the great main line dash through it scornfully.
