Correspondence Between the Vatican and the Court of Great Britain.

(London Times, June 25,) Two parliamentary papers were published yesterday containing the correspondence that passed between the Vatican and the Court of Great Britain with regard to Monsigner Ruffo Scilla's mission on the occasion of the Queen's Jubilee and the Duke of Norfolk's special mission to the Pope to express the Queen's sense of His Holiness' courtesy, and also to congratulate the Pope on the 50th anniversary of his entering on the sacerdotal office. The following personal correspondence occurred with regard to Her Majesty's Jubilee:

POPE LEO XIII. TO HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN, The Vatican, June 10, 1887. Your Majesty-It is now 50 years since your Majesty, raised to the Throne of England, has known how, by a glorious and beneficent reign. to conquer the love of the subjects of your immense Empire, and the universal admiration of all nations. 
