## The Late Judge Watters.

The Honorable Charles Watters, Judge of the Court of Vice Admiralty for the Province of New Brunswick, Judge of the County Court of St. John and Revising Burrister for the city and county of St. John, died at his residence, St. John, on Friday morning last. He appeared to be in good health on Thursday, attending to his official duties in the usual way, and retiring at his accustomed hour. He did not appear at breakfast on Friday morning and on one of his daughters going to his room, she found him lying across his bed, where he had apparently fallen and died while in the act of dressing. The deceased judge was in his 73rd year, although he appeared years younger. He was a prominent man in the legislature and government of the province for ten or more years before Confederation, where his great capacity for work, and high character as a public man, were very generally recognised. In 1867 he was appointed to the County judgeship, to the Vice-Admiralty judgeship in 1876 and to the position of Revising Barrister in 1885. # The Reason for the Dismissal of Mr.

NEWCASTLE, Aug. 8, 1891. To the Editor of the Miramichi Advance.
