Curing Pork.

Following plan for curing pork has the experience of years to back its excellence: The barrel in which the pork is to be pickled must be perfectly clean. Now fill the barrel with saturated brine, and be assured that your side pork is well packtotally different basis from the argument for ed. It is wise to watch the brine, however, skim it, and when cold drain it into the barrel. If there is not enough brine to cover the meat, put as much salt into a pail of water as it will dissolve, and drain it into a barrel. Ham and Bacon .- Pack the meat in a sweet clean cask, and cover with brine made as follows: Take half as much water as will cover the meat, and put in all the salt it will dissolve; add the other half of the water required, with two quarts of molasses and a quarter of a pound of saltpetre for each hundred pounds of meat. In six weeks the meat will be ready for smoking. It should be hung in the smokehouse for a day or two before the smoking begins, to dry off, In dry weather a dark smokehouse is necessary, to guard against flies. As soon as the meat is sufficiently smoked, which is largely a matter of taste, each piece should be en veloped into a strong paper bag, fastened securely so no insect can get through where it is tied, and hung in a dry place. 
