D gby can now boast of the finest fleet of fishing eraft it has ever owned. To the keen insight and enterprise of a few Digby skippers undertaking. They were the men to discern trat if Gloucester could afford to equip and man costly and protitable fishing craft for the industry, the same rule was not applicable to our own ports. Consequently they succeeded in purchasing last season some six or seven American bankers, which at considerable expense were placed in the halibut, cod, and haddock fishery. The success of the enterprise we are glad to say has been such as to offer good remuneration for the outlay. Following are the foreign vessels purchased during the past season: Franklin Schenek, Mary E. Whorf, Chas. Haskill, George J. Tarr, and Pheobe & Emma Small. The fleet now comprises fifteen vessels averaging forty-seven tons, and employing 181 men. The aggregate for the past season is \$55,316. It must be borne in migd that some of vessels were purchased late in the season, their stock consequently amounting to little, which of course will cus the average down. The J. H. Kennedy, Capt. Wm. Snow, is high line of the fleet, with a stock of \$8,387. Following in order come the Mary E. Whorf, Capt. H. Ander son: Edward A. Horton, Capt. J. Saow, and Annie M. Sproul, Capt. John Sproul, each stocking over \$6,500. In addition to the above named are the Chas. Haskell, George J. Tarr, Franklin Schenek, Eihu Burritt, Constitution, Josie L. Day, P. & E. Small, West Wind, Gazelle, James Farnham and Speed. As an instance of the advantage which the foreign markets afford our fishermen, it will not be out of place to note the values of the shipments made to the American and West India ports by one of the above named vessels. The J. H. Kennedy, during her two months spring fishing, sold for the New York market halibut and large cod amounting to \$3,300; during the following eight weeks, scaled fish to the West Indies amounting to \$1,560; and during the mext seven weeks, sold in Boston market mackerel and shad amounting to \$1886; in all \$6,746, to foreign markets as compared with \$1,640 shipped for home market.

The "St. Nicholas."

The drifting ashore of the Str. St. Nicholas of Chatham at Grand Manan, on Wednesday evening, 30th ult., indicates that the officers in charge have a happy-go-lucky way of looking after their vessel. The day had been a very rough one in Grand Harbor, where the steamer lay, the wind being from the southeast. Early in the afternoon the barometer suddenly fell, indicating a change and heavy wind. Soon, the wind shifted to the northwest and blew in heavy squalls. which momentarily increased. As the steamer shows more than usual resistance to the wind, owing to her deck-houses, etc., ordinary prudence ought to have suggested that steam be kept up for an emergency. At all events, that is the practice with our steamboat men under such circumstances. On this occasion, however, when the strain parted one of the chains at the anchor-ring, the boat drifted helplessly before the gale, carrying the other anchor away with her, and went ashore on Harbor Island-fortunately in what is, perhaps, the least dangerous place on that coast, the beach being smooth and composed of gravel. Had she gone ashore a few lengths eastwardly of her position, it is said the results would have been very serious. There was a com mendable alacrity manifested on board t get steam up, after the chain parted, although this sense of duty seems to have come to those responsible for the vessel, a little late. By Saturday the crew had removed enough gravel from around the hull to form a trench out of which the steamer fleated at high tide, and thus had a fortunate deliverance. It is said the "ground tackle" of the boat was too light. Valuable Discoveries.

Moneton and St. John newspapers report that a valuable discovery of mineral paint is reported from the north-west Miramichi, about 20 miles from Newcastle. An assay shows it to be composed of 96 per cent. pure oxide of iron. It comes of veins of a slaty formation of rock, of the consistency of putty and ready for use. Mr. Brumell of the Dominion geological survey is much interested in the deposits. He says there is nothing like them known to scientists. The deposits are extensive. The paint is ready for use when taken from the rock, two pounds giving the required body to a gallon of oil. Mixed with water, four or five pounds of the oxide will also give a strong rose color to a barrel of whiting, and as it is fire-proof it is more durable than white lead and much stronger than any other known pigment. John Ferguson of Newcastle holds a mining license for this deposit, and it is thought he has a big thing. Gold and eilver bearing quartz has also been discovered in the same neighborhood, having been located by Walter Mc. South WEST Dougall, acting for Montreal parties. The Johnson-Robertson company of Montreal have several miles of mining licenses located, and the Ferguson-Coleman syndicate, in which Mr. Adams M.
