
CAMP ADAMS.

An Ottawa despatch says the fisheries department has received from Superintendent Ogden reports of the success of the Picton lobster hatchery for the present season. The hatchery has produced this season 65,000,000 young lobsters, which have been distributed along the Northumberland straits. It is doubtful if any of the experiments made in Newfoundland by the Norwegian expert

The Department has issued bulletin No. 2 on the use of the floating incubators for hatching the ova of the lobster. It is admitted by everyone connected with the Canadian lobster industry that the general destruction of female lobsters carrying ova has been one of the most important factors in the depletion of the fishery. Various observations are agreed that an average sized adult female lobster carries between 20,000 and 25,000 ova. If these are collected and hatched out artificially the fishery will soon improve. Artificial hatching has been successfully carried out by Mr. Neilson, the superintendent of fisheries for Newfoundand, and the model of incubator adopted in Canada is in outline similar to the Neilson one, but modified by the addition of an inner trough, an improvement designed by Mr. Wilmot, the superintendent of fish culture


