## The Murray Estate.

(St. John Globe, 25th.) In the Equity Court, in re the estate William Murray, of Chatham, insolvent, Mr. F. E. Barker, Q. C., moved before Judge Tuck this morning for an order relieving Hon. Allan Ritchie of the trusts, In the petition presented by Mr. Ritchie, it is stated that the assets of the business amount to about \$46,000, besides the book debts, the total amount being \$72,000, and that the liabilities amount to about \$60,000. It is also stated that Mr. Ruchie at first declined to accept the trusts along with the other trustees, as he lived away from the bus ness and had other duties to attend to. but was induced to do so on the understanding that the estate would soon be settled by compromise. But now he finds that the trusts are going to be carried out. and, as he lives at Newcastle, he thinks the other trustees, who live at Chatham, where the business is situated, can perform the trusts without him. Mr. C. W. Weldon, Q. C., appeared for the Bank of Montreal, Isabel Murray, wife of the assignor, and Mr. W. J. Fraser, who are preferred creditors by the trust deed, and said that on behalf of his clients he would consent to the removal of Mr. Ritchie, but he thought that, as Mr. Barker had suggested, a new trustee should be appointed. He suggested that Mr. F. E. Winslow, manager of the Bank of Montreal, who are the heaviest

creditors, should be appointed. Mr. R. A. Lawlor, appearing for himself, and Mr. T. DesBrisay the other trustees, said they had objections to acting with Mr. Winslow, as certain complications would likely arise in determining the amount of the c'aim of the Bank on Montreal, and that he wished to avoid any differences arising among the trustees, and also that the business was now about all done, so that they did not think it was necessary to appoint Mr. Winslow.

His Honor said that personally he did not have anything against the appointment but he did not think that a heavy creditor was the best person to administer an estate. He s. he did not feel like appointing him either without the concurrence of the other | fore trustees. The order was made removing Mr. Ritchie and the hearing was adjourned until next Friday at 11 o'clock to consider the appointment of another trustee.
