



Delicious Maryland Biscuit.

Aunt Hannah's pride was her old-fashioned beaten or kneaded biscuit, and this is her receipt : One quart of the best flour, half a teaspoonful of salt, four ounces of lard chopped fine and rubbed thoroughly into the flour. Mix with cold water just as stiff as possible, so stiff that you feel almost hopeless of ever doing anything with it. Put it on a board and knead until it is perfectly pliable and makes a popping sound under your hands from the air bubbles breaking in it, and until you can pull it down in long thin strips. These tests are infallible, but you have to knead hard and long before the dough will answer to them. When it does you can make the biscuit. Break off pieces about the size of an egg. Mould them into round balls, and roll threequarters of an inch thick with a rolling-pin. Stick through and through five or six times with a fork. The oven must be well heated but not too hot, or they will be underdone in the middle and all of their excellence
