We understand that Scott Act Inspector Menzies intimated at a public meeting i Chatham, last Thursday evening, that the editor of the ADVANCE was a spectator of a raid he made on the premises of Mr. Murray or Mr. Johnston, and some adjoining property at Newcastle on that day and, seeing him assaulted, either refrained from going to his rescue or encouraged his assailants. What Mr. Menzies and his associates in these raids and meetings hope to gain by thus constantly dragging the name of the editor of this paper before the public in this impertinent manner, it would be difficult for persons who strive to mind their own business to determine. We have only to say that Mr. Menzies stated what was untrue. as the editor was not present when the raid referred to was made, nor had he any knowledge of it until informed of it after it was over. The new train arrangement improves the service of that road very much, giving greater accommodation and better connec tions than any former one. The connections at Chatham Junction with the Intercolonial are not as close as desirable, but we are assured by the officials that they are the best that can be made without increasing the train staff to a greater extent than the present earnings of the road will justify.
