FATAL ACCIDENT IN BATHURST VILLAGE On the morning of Tuesday last a young lad named Edward White, 15 years of age, and son of Mr. John White, of Bathurst Village, lost his life in the shingle mill of Messrs. O. F. Stacey & Co., of that place. The little fellow was employed in the mill cutting wire for bunching shingles. Before commencing work he went under one of the machines which was in motion. His coat caught in the belting and he was quickly drawn to and around the drum. When wound machinery was stopped it was found that he was horribly mangled. Both legs and one arm were torn off. He died a moment or so after being taken out. Dr. Duncan was im mediately on the ground. An inquest was held by Coroner Meahan and a verdict of accidental death returned.

SUICIDE :- Joseph Monahan of Nelson, lad of about 17 years, who had been acting somewhat strangely of late, went to bed on Friday night last as usual and was missing in the morning. Members of the family found traces of blood near the back door of the house and down towards the river where after due search the body was found. The poor fellow had cut his throat and also gashed the lower part of his body across after which it is presumed he went, with the nerve of insanity to finish his suicidal work in the river.

Dr. Pedolin, coroner, enquired into the case and being satisfied that it was one suicide caused by insanity did not think it necessary to hold an inquest.


