In conversation with a representative of The World last evening, Mr. Girard, foreman of one of the departments, mentioned that his firm was just now putting in a band-saw mill, to operate on larger timber than has been customary with that class of saw in factories in British Columbia. The band-saw is now made to cut up timber six feet in diameter; but as this is considerably heavier than the material used in Messrs Cassady & Co's mill, the one being set up will saw lumber 24 inches across. As the band-saw in its operations saws about one-tenth of the wood sawn, it will readily be seen that, especially with regard to the more expensive or scarcer grades of timber, it will effect a very large saving to the company employing machinery of this nature. The firm alluded to above is the only one in the city that is running full time of tenderers.
