Sealed by Mr. Hugh McIntyre, it proved to be 72 feet in length and 24 inches in diameter, 50 feet from the butt—contents, 1800 feet—next farmer.

A PROSPEROUS BANK.—The general statement of the Bank of Nova Scotia for the past year is just received and makes a very favorable showing. The paid-up capital is \$1,500,000, and the reserve \$1,000,000, an increase of \$300,000 in the reserve since Dec. 31, 1890, of which \$107,150 is from profits, and \$192,850 premium on new stock (fifty p. c.) on \$385,700. The bank had on deposit at call on Dec. 31, 1891, \$1,443,199.95; and subject to notice, with interest, \$4,281,755.68. The net profit for the year was \$210,255, out of which the shareholders get two dividends, \$12,405.98 in August last, and \$38,314.59 now payable. \$107,150 goes to the reserve as already stated, and \$9,654.83 is carried forward. John Donell, Esq., is president; Mr. Thomas Fyffe is cashier, and Mr. F. A. Morrison is agent at Chatham and Newcastle. This bank has ten agencies in Nova Scotia, two in P. E. I., thirteen in New Brunswick, and one each in Montreal, the United States and West Indies.

Another Stop Forward.

The firm of George Casady & Co., on Falls Creek, cash and door manufacturers, etc., is one of the most enterprising of the various sawmill concerns in Vancouver, and at present is turning out more work than any of the other individuals or companies in its line in the city. In conversation with a representative of The World last evening, Mr. Girard, foreman of one of the departments, mentioned that his firm was just now putting in a band-saw mill, to operate on larger timber than has been customary with the class of saws in factories in British Columbia. The band-saw is now made to cut up timber six feet in diameter; but as this is considerably heavier than the material used in Messrs Casady & Co's mill, the one being set up will saw lumber 24 inches across. As the band-saw in its operations saves about one-tenth of the wood sawn, it will readily be seen that, especially with regard to the more expensive or scarcer grades of timber, it will effect a very large saving to the company employing machinery of this nature. The firm alluded to above is the late firm of Clarke, Kerr & Thomas, as Buyer and Manager for the Wholesale Department, and Mr. Robertson's as Traveller, will insure a knowledge of the needs of the Country in the above line of business.

A Vandal about.

A bottle that was filled with some liquid, supposed to be water, was thrown by an unknown person through one of the windows of the residence of Rev. Thos. Marshall, pastor of St. Luke's Church, Henderson Street, Chatham, on Monday night about ten o'clock. It must have been thrown with considerable force, as it made comparatively small holes in both inside and outside windows. There was, fortunately, no person in the room at the time, which suggests the idea that the act was one of sheer destructiveness by some drunken or otherwise insane person, rather than an attempt to do personal injury to any of the inmates of the house. The leading thought in connection with such acts as this is the regret that the perpetrator is not detected, so that he might receive the full penalty which the law prescribes for such criminal offences. Our community is, happily, seldom disturbed by such wanton and cowardly interferences with the quiet of the homes of its citizens, and the outrage on that of Mr. Marshall is felt by everyone as almost a personal offence, and if the perpetrator could be found out, it is quite safe to say that he would soon be in quarters, where water would be supplied to him much more regularly than bottles.

The Smelt Fishery.

The smelt fishery has been rather peculiar this year. The first stage, the hook and line fishing from wharves, river bank, and bridge piers, was fairly successful as to quantity and entirely so as to profits. Smelts have brought from 10 to 15 cents per pound clear to the fisherman. Some of the local high-liners have made \$3 and \$4 a night for two weeks or more, while two brothers in Waldoboro who ran quite an establishment on the banks of the Medomak, pulled in \$30 in less than a week. Several men along the route of the steamer "Phantom" made \$25 a week while the pole fishing lasted.

How to Mend Lace.

The mending of lace is an art of itself, and many professional menders, who are usually engaged in Germany, earn handsome livings working at this delicate task, writes Emma M. Hooper in the February Ladies' Home Journal. A knowledge of lace stitching is necessary in mending handsome lace. If an ordinary piece tears hand it with lace thread, which comes in small balls at five to ten cents, imitating the groundwork mesh to the best of your ability. Before taking a stitch base the lace on a piece of embroidery, leather or stiff paper, otherwise it will be drawn out of shape and distorted by puckers. In pulling on the basting threads after any such tear, be careful to clip the threads into short lengths.
