

The divers at work round the wreck of the Cabo Machicaco says that there are some two hundred cases of dynamite in her hold. They are very reluctant to continue the search for bodies. It has transpired to-day that the fifty tons of dynamite carried by the vessel were not cantraband. Excepting the twenty cases landed, the dynamite was intended for other ports than Santander. THE CAPTURE OF BULUWAYO. LONDON, Nov. 9.- A special despatch


