



> The nitro powders are very much more dense than the others, and consequently more high y explosive. Great care is necessary in using them. In fact, one must be more or less of an expert to handle them satisfactorily. I do not remember, however,

to have heard any complaints from our customers of bursting gun barrels from the use of the Schultze powder.

I asked Mr. Giles as to the frequency of ceidents in general from the bursting of gun barrels.


