## Death of Geo. Taylor.

Mr. Geo. Taylor, late general freight agent of the Intercolonial Railway died at Bedford, Halifax, last week of hemorrhage of the lungs. Mr. Taylor was born at Edinburg, Scotland, on August 25th 1832 and removed to Halifax when very young. On June 3rd 1857 he entered the government's service as construction clerk on the road then known as the Nova Scotia railway with head quarters at Halifax. His very efficient service and capability were soon note 1 and on June 1st 1858 he was pro noted to the position of accountant in the works department. On March 15th 1860, he was made traffic superintendent and on January 14th 1870 was raised to the responsible position of General Superintendent of the railway lines in Nova Scotia with headquarters at Halifax. On Nov. 9th 1872, he was transferred to Moncton and made General Freight Agent of the I. C. R. under Superintendent Luttrell, In 1874 at the time of the change of government, he was offered a minor position under Superintendent Brydges, but refused and was retired. On March 1st, 1879, a change of government having taken place, he was recalled and made General Freight and Passenger Agent of the I. C. R. Business on the road having considerably increased during the following year it was deemed necessary to make two departments of the Freight and Passenger business and accordingly Mr. A. Busby was appointed General Passenger Agent, while Mr. Taylor was given the former position which he retained up to the date of his superannuation, which took place recently. He was a general favorite with both old and young and although sometimes severe in his official capacity he counteracted the whole by his affability and genial manner in private life. ## A Strange Craft.

This is what the St. John's, Nfl. Despatch thought of Capt. Chris. Mc-Lean's good schooner Autumn Belle-the same vessel that brought 136 tons of coal into Chatham about Dec. 1st, twenty of it being on her deck which about two inches out of wa'er amidships. The Despatch said:—"An interesting vessel may be seen at the Municipal basic, where she is discharging a cargo of lumber. She is called the Autumn Belle, and hails from Chatham, N. B., and is one of a class of vessels that are constructed in New Brunswick especially for the lumber trade. These vessels are called wood boats, and are very broad of beam, and wide on deck, with fine lines below. They carry two taunt masts, all upright, on which are bent two sails.
