

PAVILION IN THE MANUFACTURES.

It Is the Most Costly and Impressive One in That Mammoth Building-Five Thousand Exhibitors at the Exposition -Many Features of Interest from the WORLD'S FAIR, July 11. - [Special.] -


Never before did Germany make so fine a

display of her arts and industries at an international exposition. Deutchland's exhibits rank with those of Great Britain and France in amount of space occupied, about twelve acres. It has spent more money here than any other foreign nation, France alone excepted. The amount apropriated for this exposition by the German government was about three-quarters of a million of dollars. If to this sum be added the monies expended here by private exhibitors, the total of German outlay will be found to far exceed that of any other country. There are more exhibitors here from Germanythan any other foreign country, their number being about five

Germany has the costliest and most im pressive pavilion in the Manufactures building. It has the largest and most picturesque of all the foreign buildings. In Machinery hall and the Electricity building it makes a better showing than great Krupp gun and heavy forgings exhibit, in a special building, is one of the sensations of the fair. In the Transportation department it is more interesting than any of its European rivals, Great Britain alone excepted. In the Palace of Fine Arts it is second among the foreign nations, France alone taking precedence; and from some points of view Germany is ahead even there. In horticulture Deutchland is beautiful, for it is German florists who have made Wooded island, that charming bit of landscape within the great lagoons, blossom with the rese. In the Mining building Germany is far ahead of any other foreign land, In Midway plaisance the German village and the German military bands form a striking and popular feature of life in that cosmopolitan This rapid resume of the status of the

German display at this greatest of world's fairs shows how much right the son of the Fatherland has to feel proud of his native country when he walks through these amazing grounds. In the friendly rivalry Two or three years ago, when preparahad long awaited to show civilization that the people of the empire had kept pace

There is so much bere from the Fatherland, so many things and features of inabout them. But I can say, in all candor, that the man who makes a careful study of the German exhibits in the thirteen great departments of the exposition, inspeeding them not only with thought of what the vare but of what stands behind them. will finish his task with his heart full of affection and his mind charged with admiration for that great people. Where the Commans excel most other nations is in their devotion to the commonplaces of life. The Franch show more beautiful articles of vertu, far greater skill in the fabrication of things which



usefuliness they are behind the Germans, No detail of the problem or process of living, of habitation, instrument or tool, is too small for the consideration of the plodding Tenton. And I notice that where the I rene's excel the world in the fashioning of things which only the rich can afford to buy, German effort is largely directed to the preduction of sound, thorough, desirable articles of usefulness for the masses of people whose incomes are but slender.

After all, the Germans are only a little behind the French even in the proudest field of the latter. In the making of what we may term, in the absence of a better name, the fine things, the Germans are almost as prolific as the French. They lack chiefly in design, in lightness of touch, and in variability. They stick too closely to the mational characteristic, which is heavy and gombre, as a rule, and running to the other extreme of profuse gilt or gold-leaf when color or brightness is aimed at. The Germans have the workmanship, the patience, the artistic instinct, though the last named is too much in a rut. But

when we remember that design is largely a matter of taste, and that certain variations of form become popular through some caprice of the popular fancy, it is possible we may be forced to admit that German designs are not less artistic than the French, but merely less fashionable. There is ample evidence here that the French have made the most of the fortuitous circumstances which gave Paris absolute leadership in the world's feminine fashions. They have followed up this advantage throughout all the lines of light monufacto a in the struggle to maintant this sup me y they have proved themselves not only original but adapt-

able, now borrowing from the Japanese, again from the Italians, even from the Americans. While the French are thus reeking forms of beauty and hints in decoration from all creation one must admire the persistence with which the Germans eling to their own types and character-Even if we are not admirers of the German style we shall be amazed at the beauty of the things which they have to

thow us in the Manufactures palace. To

begin with, their great pavilion catches vir eye. It is rich and vast, and composed of many parts, but has a certain unity all its own, like the empire which it represents. There are towers and battlements and facing Columbia avenue the greatest triplet of wrought iron gates ever seen in this country. They rise more than twenty feet from the floor, and with their flanking fence of the same material enclose a spacious court yard or palace plaza. Far in the rear, towering over all, is the huge bronze Germania which is to adorn the

new form of beauty will entrance you. First it is the royal porcelain works of Ber-lin, displaying in attractive style the glorlous products of those unrivalled furnaces. Here is a dining room, complete, with porcelain service and solid gold knives, forks and spoons. Near by are the Baden furniture and terra cottas, already popular in America. At the left one is delighted

with the display of a Frankfort-on-Main firm who are announced as "jewelers to their majesties the Emperor of Germany and the Empress Frederick." They show a jardiniere center piece in solid silver, valued at \$2,100. The gem of their collection is the Columbian diamond, 17 karats weight, and nearly an inch in diameter. It is a blue brilliant of first water, the same color possessed by the famous Nancy, Regent and Great Mogul stones. Its value is placed at \$15,000, and I believe it is the finest diamond to be seen in the exposi-



## CAIN'S RIVER AND TRIBUTARIES.

The subscriber begs to direct the attention of all persons concerned to the following extract from the Act of Assembly passed 15th April 1893, entitled An Act to Further Amend the Fisheries Act 1884":-

1. Section 16 of "The Fisheries Act, 1884," is hereby repealed, and the following enacted in lieu thereof:— THE EAST END FACTORY, CHATHAM, N. B. thereof:—

"16. Any person trespassing upon the Fishery of any riparian proprietor or person occupying under bim, and any person fishing in the waters of any lake without permission of the owner or lessee thereof, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than five, nor more than twenty dollars for each offence, which may be recovered before any Justice of the Peace for the County in which the offence is committed, and in default of payment of such fine and costs of prosecution, shall be liable to imprisonment in the common gaol of the County for, a term not exceeding tnirty days."
