FISH AT THE FAIR.

Walter Wellman Writes of a Romantic Industry.

COEAN'S PRECIOUS GIFT TO MAN.

The Wonderful Scope and Variety of the World's Fisheries-From the Equator to the Arctics -- Lofoden in Norway and Gloucester in America-What a Woman

World's Fair, June 15 .- [Special.] -

One of the most surprising features of the exposition is the fisheries building and the exhibit which it houses. In a former letter I described the beauties of the salt and fresh water aquaria and the charm their countless inhabitants exercise over many thousands of visitors every day. One can understand that, for the privilege of seeing all varieties of live fish disport in their native element is one which people do not often enjoy. But I confess I was surprised at the interest manifested by the throngs of exposition visitors in the main building of the fisheries, where no live fish are to be seen. Every day I saw streams of people going in and out of this structure, and finally I determined to see what it was that exercised such fascination over them within. After a tour of the building I am no

longer amazed at the popular interest in its contents. I never before realized the important part which fisheries play in the commerce of the world, never understood, as I do now, the almost infinite variety of fish products and their value as food, in the arts, and in medicine. Above and begond all this there is a glamour of romance about the fishing industry. It must go to sea in boats, must bear the dangers of the deep, has in it that which develops character and feeling, with now and then a tragedy in real life, and is, withal, continuously and inevitably picturesque.

Everything that industry and science have rescued from the depths of lake, river and sea is shown here; inhabitants of deep sea grottocs, the coral animal-sea anemones that blossom miles below the surface of the ocean; specimens of sub-aqueous plant life so marvellously delicate their film-like tracery. Very interesting is the exhibit of the United States Fish commission of the methods employed by it in deep sea work, in propagating fish and stocking our rivers and lakes. These Norwegians start early in the year for the Arctic ocean, driving their little schooners into the ice with an intrepidity which astonishes the Arctic explorers who, fitted with steam vessels and all appliances for fighting ice, are afraid to follow. Fishermen from Tromsoe and Hammerfest every year accomplish feats in the northern waters which would add to the fame of Arctic explorers, but the Norwegians are Arctic explorers, but the Norwegians are after fish, seal, walrus, eider down, whales,

after fish, seal, walrus, eider down, whales, not glory. Almost every year some of these little craft go north of Spitzbergen and reach a latitude that is within 500 geographical miles of the north pole. Occasionally one is nipped in the ice up there, and the master and crew, unless rescued by other fishermen, must pass the long Arctic winter in improvised huts and subsist upon such game as they may be able to take before darkness sets in about the first of October. Sometimes they do this successfully; others, their bones are found in the spring where starvation or scurvy left them.

left them.

The Norwegians show here specimens of the craft and the weapons with which they assail the walrus, the seal and the polar bear. They show also the paraphernalia of one of the most wonderful fishing scenes which the world contains, that at the Lofoden islands in February and March. During ten months of the year these islands are practically deserted. For two months the sun does not show himself. The scene is one of polar calm and white ness. But in February myriads of cod-fish come to the islands, no one knows from where, to spawn. The fishermen come, too. Thirty thousand men come, bringing from 7,000 to 8,000 boats. They create a sity on the shores. By day their boats literally cover the sea for miles and miles—til their fishing is done within sight from

all their fishing is done within sight from land—mixing a spectacle such as cannot be found anywhere else in the world. Government regulates everything in these fisheries. Among the 30,000 men there is no disorder, no crime. No intoxicating liquors are allowed on the islands. All the boats must leave the land at a certain hour in the morning, and a magnificent sight it must be when seven thousand craft, each manned by four oarsmen, dip the water at a signal and race to the fishing grounds.

Thirty million cod are caught every year in these great fisheries, and so important is this industry to the wealth and prosperity of Norway that the number caught each day is telegraphed by the government to the commercial exchanges in every city of Christendom. Peter Moller is the in-dustrial king of Lofoden, and here in

would be no show at all. And Gloucester is nobly represented. A great model of the harbor of Gloncester shows the wharfs, the warehouses, the salt and fish docks. On the waters of the bay, which are strikingly real, ride accurate models of Gloucester fishing schooners used from 1623 to the present time. Of course there has been great progress. Here we may learn what few of us ever knew before—how the word "schooner" originated. It is a pretty lit-

One Captain Andrew Robinson was an original, inventive chap. Just 180 years ago he masted and rigged a new vessel in the fore and aft style which we see at the present day, and when he launched her and she dipped the water some old wag of a bystander sung out: "O, how she scoons!"

"Very well, a schooner let her be," said Gloucester now has 400 fishing schooners of average capacity of eighty-one tons.
The novel and interesting exhibit made here by her board of trade fixes in the mind as nothing else could do the fact that the quaint Cape Cod town is the greatest fishing center on the western continent. Among hundreds of instructive displays I can pause to describe but one more. It represents an actual fishing scene in Boston bay. By a clever contrivance the sur-


