There is reason to think that great wealth begets a mental disease akin to those forms of paralysis which affects a minute portion of the brain while the general intelligence remains sound, says the Saturday Review.
It is not to be denied that the very rich as a class, show as much sense as other people. Those who make their own fortunes may well have narrowed their minds in the process.
