 The Petrolia region sends oil in all stages, from the crude to the refined. Mineral water finds a prominent place, one of the brands being from Caledonia.
 From Barrie township goes a piece of ore which yielded 99 oz. 15 dwts. of silver to the ton.
 Some excellent copper and nickel ore from the Sudbury district have been furnished by Mr. R. H. Ahn.
 A number of excellent samples of silver and gold have been obtained from the mine of Mr. A. J. Cockburn, of Toronto, in the Nipissing district.
 In crystals there is a perfect copy of a maple leaf. In another case garnet, amethyst and topaz crystals about their polished surfaces to the admiring gaze. A real curiosity is a piece of gneiss, with a glittering surface dotted here and there with garnets.
