The last seen of the steamer with her tow was at two o'clock Monday afternoon off Liscomb, 75 miles east of Halifax. She appeared to be working away from the shore. The south-east wind then blowing was on her quarter and aided her progress. On Tuesday morning the people of Three Fathom Harbor, sixty miles west of Liscomb, and fifteen miles east of Halifax, observed a wreck on the shore and, soon, it became apparant that two ressels had been lost. Bodies of men, a woman and some children were also seensome cast ashore and others floating amongst wreckage. Then it became known that the wrecks were those of the Dorcas and Etta Stewart and that twenty-four persons who were in the two vessels were lost, not one survivor being left to tell the tale of the terrible disaster. It is believed Capt.
