that the utmost precautions shall be taken to preserve the rights of Ulster. All they ask is fair play and equality. He had urged upon Mr. Blake, and Mr. Blake assured him that the Irish party had already urged upon Mr. Gladstone to meet the wishes of Ulster in every particular so long as they did not trench upon the rights of others.

Regarding the matter of revenue, the Irish parliament would get the excess receipts and other minor revenues, while the customs receipts went into the imperial exchequer.

The parliament will have the power to appoint judges, except that the present incumbents are not to be removed except for cause; and that the Queen will appoint two ex-quo-vice judges, who will attend to customs and excise matters and imperial elections, giving the balance of their time to aid the other judges.

Regarding the land laws, Mr. Gladstone reserves the right for the imperial government to deal with that for three years, by which time he hopes to have it settled. The present purchase system inaugurated by the Salisbury government is a very good one, and paves the way for more extensive reform in that line.

If home rule triumphed it would be the interest of Ireland as part of the empire to uphold the empire. If their just demands were accorded they would prove to the world that they were satisfied, and England would find them standing by her side in the empire and in the hour of danger her right hand and most powerful weapon. (Cheers.)
