DECLINE OF PUPILS IN ONTARIO. The annual report of the Ontario commisioner of education shows a decline of 5,000 pupils in the attendance at the public schools of the province in 1892, as compared with the returns of the preceding year. This decline is attributed to the exodus of the people from the province.


