He of killing only a portion of the bugs is having a very serious effect on the crop. both

The buge should be more thoroughly exterminated. Many farmers do not attend to this and others only in part. The result is the pests spread all over the country and eat all they want. The tubers can only grow through the leaves; when the supply is devouted by these bugs the crop must suffer The result is, we seldom see the fine, large, dry potatoes that formerly were so plentitul all over the province. Every farmer should make an effort to clean his crop of these gluttons, and if all would do this the improvement in the crop would repay them for the labor. The cost of the small quantity of Paris green required is very little, so the labor is nearly all that car be counted. And here we may remark that usually far too much of the poison is used. The smallest quantity that can be applied is sufficient to kill the bugs. One pound of Paris green to eighty or one hundred gal lons of water is sufficient, provided it is properly applied, which should be done as often as required to kill all. It is a great loss to the country to allow such a valuable crop to be destroyed, when a moderate amount of labor and cost will save it.

OTTAWA, May 1.-Canada's big cheese is Newcastle, 2nd May, 1893 carrying everything before it at Chicago. On Saturday it carried the floor of the dairy building where it is located down ten feet to terra firma. The floor was damaged but the cheese was not. Special supports have been provided.

A Man who Knew How to Live. Col. Charles B. Tappen, who died in New York the other day at the rips old age of 98, was known as one of the most remarkable of the old inhabitants of that city. Almost up to the day of his death he could walk, talk and make merry with men who were scores of years his junior. Many years ago he decided upon certain rules of living which he adhered to as long as he lived. One of these rales was never to ride when it was possible to walk. 


