> STIFFENING THE TARIFF. During the week just closed a number o changes have been made in the items. The most noticable of these changes are in woollens, where specific duties have in a great measure been restored, and this substitution of specific for ad valorem duty has been the distinctive feature of most of the changes made from the original resolutions as introduced.

> > AMENDING THE FRANCHISE ACT. In reply to a question the other day Sir John Thompson said that it would necessary to introduce a bill this session to amend the Franchise Act so make







MINOR NOTES.

The Queen's birthday vacation will extend from Wednesday until next Monday. The Senate has already adjourned from last Friday until 6th June.

The Senate has been kept unusually close at work this year by its new leader the Hon. Mackenzie Bowell, and up to last Friday, had only sat two days less than the House of Commons. Almost every year it has been the custom for the Senate to adjourn for a couple of weeks in the early part of the session, while it was waiting for legisation to pass the Commons and be submitted to it : but this year owing to the Insolvency Bill, the amendments to the Indian Act, the Bill relating to the protection of fur-bearing animals, the Bill amending the Insurance Act, and a number of other government measures being introduced in the Senate, the second chamber has been kept well at work and has certainly done its fair share of legislation. The session will undoubtly have been greatly prolonged if these Bills had been kept in abeyance until after the tariff discussion was closed in the House.
