





The Latest War Notes.

LONDON, October 15 .- A despatch from Tokio says an imperial rescript has issued, convoking the Japanese parliament in extra session at Hircshima. The session is for the purpose of discussing matters connected with the existing war, which require parliamentary sanction. At the time dissolution of the past parliament various party leaders were at swords point. The war healed all differences and brought the factions together. Efforts are being made to have all parties and represented in the new cabinet. None of the portfolios are vacant, and it is proposed to create new cabinet officers to secure the co-operation of the former opposition leaders, Among those urged for the new offices are the most active leaders of the parties oppos ed to the government prior to the war. WASHINGTON, October 15.-A cablegram

was received this .morning by the department of state from U. S. Charge d'Affaires Denby, at Peking, stating that reports of danger to foreign residents at Peking are greatly exaggerated. There has been only one attack upon an American, which was followe! by prompt punishment and an imperial proclamation issued to local author ities enjoining the protection of foreigners. LONDON, October 15.-The Times cor respondent in Berlin says Germany ha formally intimated that she is not prepared to join in any measure to circumscribe the political results of the Chinese-Japanese


