They Must Answer. Mr. J. T. Bulmer is evidently an intended candidate again for the House of Commons. A despatch of 20th from Annapolis says:—"The temperance convention here agreed that the candidates of both political parties must answer the following questions: Are you a teetotaler; are you a pledged prohibitionist; will you, regardless of consequences and the attitude of your party, work for and support immediate prohibition; will you agree to publish the same in four issues of your county papers and six issues of the leading dailies of the province. In case they do not answer these questions satisfactorily third party candidates will be chosen."

Liquor Statistics and Liquor Laws. Of the tremendous national drink bill for the United Kingdom last year, which was £138,854,829, only £21,255,416 was expended in the manufacture and distribution of the drink. It is estimated that this would employ about 527,000 persons at about 25 shillings a week. But if the whole of the amount were expended in useful and necessary articles, it is claimed that nearly five times as many work people would be employed.

Death of Froude the Historian. Late despatches announce that James Anthony Froude the English historian died at London on Saturday morning last. He was the youngest son of the late venerable H. H. Froude, Archdeacon of Totnes, and was born at Darlington, Devonshire, on the 23rd April, 1818. He was educated at Westminster and at Oriel College, Oxford, where he graduated in 1840. Froude, in 1842, carried off the Chancellor's prize for an English essay on "The Influence of the Science of Political Economy on the Moral and Social Welfare of the Nation," and in the same year he became a Fellow of Exeter College.

Notice to Creditors. The attention of all holders of Timber Licenses is called to Section 19 of the Timber Regulations, which reads as follows:—"19 No felling of trees shall be cut by any licensee under any licence, not only for felling, which will not make a log at least 18 feet in length and ten feet in diameter, and if any such tree be cut, the licensee shall be liable to double the amount of the licence."

Arrest of Tramps and Burglars. ST. STEPHEN, Oct. 19.—Two men giving the name of Clarke and Smith, were arrested to-night. They are supposed to be the men who have been burglarizing stores in the town since the late arrival of the ship. They were taken to the police station and the evidence against them is strong.

THE NEW ONWARD SHIPS. Recent voyages by the two new Onward steamers Campania and Lucania, plying between New York and Liverpool, establish their records as the fastest vessels of their class now afloat. The main speed of the Campania has been 21.5 knots per hour and the Lucania 21.65 knots. The Lucania has made 555 miles in 24 hours, being the highest knot speed for that period and equivalent to 22 1/2 knots per hour. The record voyage of 5,598 miles has been made by the Campania in 10 days 20 hours 14 minutes. These are remarkable performances, and show how thoroughly strong and excellent the vessels must be in hulls and machinery.

THE DAY'S FASHIONS. The market is full of eccentricities and vagaries in the way of gloves, but all the styles are in line, with the exception of plain styles, with almost invisible stitching. Evening bouquets of flowers and lace are the latest in vogue. One pretty model is set of roses of lace with flowers. A Famous Horse Case. The Carriv case has become more and more interesting to the horsemen of the province as it proceeds. To-day the putting in of evidence was finished and the arguments of counsel will be presented at a later date. The main features in the case are the late trotting race at New Brunswick, the Trotting Association, whether Mr. Carriv, acting for George Carriv, consented to the racing "Speculation" being driven, and whether the judges could do anything more than enforce the penalty if the horse was not properly "drawn." On the 6th September a trotting match took place at the Saint Stephen Driving Park, the entries for which were "Minnie Grey," "Speculation," "Helen," "Brazilian," "Lyonscur" and "Hollis M." Mr. Carriv, the owner and "Speculation," sent the following telegram to the secretary of the Saint Stephen Driving Park on Sept. 5th:—"Speculation will not start to-morrow, to which he received an answer from Mr. Thompson stating the telegram had been received later than seven o'clock and the horse must start. This refers to the rule of the Trotting Association, which provides that no horse can be drawn except by permission of the judges, previous to the closing of the day preceding the race. Provision is also made that if a horse is entered and does not start a penalty of \$100 or suspension or expulsion of horse or driver may be enforced. In response to Mr. Thompson's telegram Mr. Carriv telegraphed that the horse must not start under any circumstances. When the time for the race came, Messrs. Smith, Osborne and Murchie were appointed judges, Mr. Osborne being the stipulated starter. The secretary, Mr. Thompson, then came up and told them of the entries and also of the fact that

Log-Cutting Hard to Beat. Drummondville, Ontario, Oct. 18.—Some rivalry has existed between certain sawmills in this part of the province as to the largest number of one-inch boards that could be cut out of logs with one circular saw in one day. The log was 10 and a half hours. Mr. Henry Bradley sawyer for the Drummond Lumber Company, situated at Forestdale, township of Blandford, can claim a record, having cut out of 66 logs of 14 inch logs, ten and a half hours work, Mr. Bradley sawed 52,815 feet of one inch boards from logs twelve and thirteen feet long. This with one circular saw. This figure was not reached through any special arrangements being made, as the cut for one week of sixty-three hours reached 229,944 feet of one inch boards, Oct. 8, 27,254 feet. The sawmill at Forestdale, is working admirably.
