Burnsville Notes.

They properly hold that if a gunner leaves his rig in the bay in this way, he does it at his own risk, and as such obstructions are an injury to the bay as a shooting ground, having a tendency to unnecessarily keep the birds from their vicinity, they should be sunk or set adrift by whoever finds them. At all events, anchored and unoccupied sink-boxes bid fair Webster's or International dictionary is not to have little respect paid to them in Tabusintac Bay, hereafter, and no sportsman or gunner will, for a moment, recognise them as carrying with them any rights to the ground they occupy, unless their owner is present also in person to shoot from them.
