### A MUSICAL MELANGE.

The American manager who has engaged  
Bivinski, the pianist, sent him a cable de-  
parting before departure: "On no account  
leave your chair out."  
At the late dinner in Carlsbad in honor  
of Labitzky, the Catholic priest composed  
a festival hymn, the Protestant minister  
and the Jewish Synagogue  
joined the singers.

Johann Strauss, the celebrated composer  
of waltz music, is shortly to celebrate his  
diamond jubilee in Vienna. He made his  
debut in 1814 at the head of a dance band  
in the gardens attached to a Viennese restaurant.

Miss Melba, the Australian prima  
donna, received one thousand dollars a  
night for each performance at the Metro-  
politan opera house, New York; Mme.  
Calle received nine hundred dollars; and  
Mme. Edmee Story six hundred dollars.

David D. Wood, who has been the  
organist of St. Stephen's Protestant Epis-  
copal church, Philadelphia, for thirty  
years, has been blind since his third year  
(he is now 56). One of his teachers at the  
institution for the blind in that city was  
James G. Blaine.

King Oscar composed an ode to the memory  
of Gounod, whose works he greatly  
admired, his majesty being himself a com-  
poser and distinguished musician. The  
king, as Prince Oscar, was the first to in-  
troduce church music into Sweden some  
twenty years ago, till then unknown.

Leonardo, the celebrated painter, was  
sponsored by Emperor William of Prussia  
for the opera of Berlin. The  
subject is the legend of the "Luther-  
burg" story, and the Elector Frederick II.  
is the principal personage in the story.  
Leonardo has laid aside all his other  
work to fulfill the king's wish.

The Santa Fe railroad is running regular  
trains out of Galveston in connection  
with the fruit steamers from Central  
America.

Last year's shortage in the English hay  
crop caused an importation into the United  
Kingdom of 293,000 tons in 1893, against  
61,287 in 1892.

There has been an improvement in the  
lines of Great Britain with Spain  
and Germany, but with France and  
Italy there has been a considerable de-  
crease.

In a field one mile square on the estate  
of W. F. Larimore, Larimore, N. B., forty-  
five men, including the owner, and  
fifty men set to work and before noon  
half of it was harvested.

The gold product of West Australia  
last year was about the same as the pre-  
vious twelve months. The total export  
for the year was 110,391 ounces. The  
prospects for the present year are most  
promising.

The police census of Brooklyn's un-  
employed shows that there are 56,676  
persons out of work. The division as to  
sex is as follows: Male, 46,688; female,  
9,988. The number of families affected is  
18,824.

Eight hundred tons of Australian butter  
were landed in London from one vessel a  
few days ago.

A company has been formed in New  
Zealand to establish a whaling station on  
the Kermadec Islands, in the Pacific ocean,  
northwest of New Zealand.

Provision is to be made for greatly en-  
larging the British museum. Five and a  
half acres will be added to the lines al-  
ready occupied, through purchase from  
the duke of Bedford.

A present of a hundred repeating rifles  
and eight thousand cartridges has just  
been made by the Austrian ministry of war  
to the Freedmen association, which has  
started a socialist colony in Africa to  
teach and practice the brotherhood of man.

An international exhibition of book and  
paper industries is to be opened in Paris in  
June next. It will comprise the various  
branches of the manufacture of books and  
paper, as well as the machinery, imple-  
ments and material used in printing and  
illustrating books.

M. Carnot completes his term of office as  
president of the French republic on De-  
cember 3 next.

Bismarck once refused some request  
of Empress Eugenie, whereupon her ma-  
jesty called him the "wild man of the  
woods."

The ameer of Afghanistan has abandoned  
his proposed visit to England. His better  
half could not agree upon which one of them  
should go with him.

The fortune of Cecil Rhodes, premier  
of Cape Colony, in Africa, is set at some-  
where from \$60,000,000 to \$75,000,000—  
all made in the diamond mines of that  
country.

In the olden days when Prince Bismarck
