Late despatches announce the death of President Rafael Nunez, of the Republic of Colombia on Tuesday, the 18th inst. Below we give a brief biographical sketch

Dr. Rafael Nunez was born on September 28, 1825, and was graduated from the university of his native city, Carthagena, in 1850.
