

TESTED RECIPES. Sauce for the Pudding .- One-half pint of water heated to the boiling point. Thicken with flour to the consistency of a good gravy. Season with a good teaspoon of butter and flavoring preferred, such as lemon, vanilla, nutmeg. etc.

Suet Pudding .- One cup of suet, chop-

ped fine, one-half cup sugar, one-half cup of molasses, one cup of rasins, three cups of flour, one teaspoon of soda, one-half teaspoon of salt; milk enough for a stiff batter. Steam one hour and a half. Buckwheat Cakes. - The old-fashioned *cakes our grandmother made were the best. Following is the receipe: To one quart of warm water add a yeast cake and a good heaping teaspoon of salt. Stir in buckwheat flour until you have a stiff batter. Set at night and keep in a warm place. In the morning add a teaspoon of soin; bake quick and serve hot. Buttermilk Cake. - Two cups of sugar, two of chopped raisins, two of buttermilk, one-half cup of shortening, four cups of




