A Big Burglary at Marysville.

This morning Mr. Manzer, barber, on his way down to his shop about 6 o'clock observed a light burning in the office in rear of Mr. Gibson's store, and, on going round to the front of the building, found two large doors broken open. They had been forced open by sheer force, the fastenings at the bottom and top having been broken.

Mr. Manzer notified Mr. Gibson's clerks, who came at once to investigate. Going through the shop to the office in the rear they discovered the door of the vault open. A hole had been drifted into the combination lock and the handle blown out. The handle was blown out with such force that it made a deep dent in the door on the opposite side of the office, ten feet away.

When the burglars had opened the vault door they found another obstacle in the way of accomplishing their scheme-a safe in the inside vault, in which the money was contained. How to Cool a Cellar. A great mistake is sometimes made in ventilating cellars and milk houses. The object of ventilation is to keep the cellars cool and dry; but this object often fails of being accomplished by a common mistake, and instead the cellar is made both warm and damp, A cool place should never be ventilated, unless the air admitted is cooler than the air within, or is at least as cool as that, or a very little warmer. The warmer the air, the more moisture it holds in suspension. Necessarily, the cooler the air, the more this moisture is condensed and percipitated. When a cool cellar is aired on a warm day, the entering air being in motion appears cool, but as it fills the cellar, the cooler air with which it becomes mixed chills it. the moisture is condensed, and dew is deposited on the cold walls and may often be seen running down them in streams. Then the cellar is damp and soon becomes mouldy. To avoid this the windows should only be opened at night, and late-the last thing before retiring. There is no need to fear that the night air is unhealthful -it is as pure as the air of midday, and is really drier. The cool air enters the apartment during the night, and circulates through it. The windows should be closed before sunrise in the morning, and kept closed and shaded through the day. If the air of the cellar is damp, it may be thoroughly dried by placing in it a peck of fresh lime in an open box, and the National Builder adds, a peck of lime will absorb about seven pounds, or about three quarts, of water, and in this way a cellar or milk house may soon be dried, even in the hottest weather. - [Sc. Am.
