village with its fine stores and residences its neat new stone church, its new building railway station and connection by rail with the Canada Eastern and I. C. R., and water connection during the season of open navi gation by the steamer Nelson with Newcastle and Chatham, and its fine steam saw mills and well-cultivated farms. VISITING THE RAILWAY.

On Friday last the writer took a trip to Nelson by the steamer called after it, and landing at the wharf proceeded to the store of John O'Brien, Esq., one of the representatives for this county in the local legislature, who very kindly had a horse yoked into a wagon and drove out the Sutton road, so called, so that a good view of the new loop line might be obtained. Leaving our team at the station, just on the rise of the hill of the left hand side as the road crosses the railway, we proceeded on foot to view the bridge over the McCullam brook which is built of cedar logs and is 225 feet long and 28 feet deep at the deepest part. There is an earth dump at each end. The bridge will be floored with cedar and covered with gravel ballast upon which the sleepers and rails are

THE LOOP LINE. This new loop line to Nelson leaves the main line about three miles from Chatham takes a circuit into Nelson, the new station being 31 miles from where the loop line leaves the old line and is 21 miles from where it again joins the old line of the Canada Eastern railway and 3 miles from Chatham Junction, increasing the length of the whole line from Chatham to the Junction, formerly 9 miles, but via Nelson it will be 12 miles. The work is progressing well, sleepers and rails having been laid to the Chatham Junction end to the bridge across McCullam brook, and a working train has been running over that portion

for the past week or ten days. About 180 men have been employed on it but the number has for the past week or more been thinning off. Mr Ruel, the engineer in charge, was on Friday last, paying off his men, he acting

as paymaster as well as engineer. THE STATION. The station is a neat building with overhanging roof, covering the platform, the building being 55x19 feet, 13 foot post, and is divided into freight house of 30 feet in length, operator's room and ticket office 15x19, and waiting room 10x19. The plasterers were at work at the ticket office and waiting room. The line will be completed in a few days and then Nelson will be in direct railway communication with

the outer world. The line from the Nelson station runs, after taking a sharp curve, through the entire length of the farm formerly known as the Sutton farm, now owned by John O'Brien. Esq., M. P. P., it then crosses the Sutton road and runs parallel with it at a distance of about sixty feet, for over a mile, crossing the Sutton road twice. The culverts are built of sound cedar logs and in one case not more, are faced with stone, as a protection against sparks and fire. There is r doubt that the business of Nelson will very materially aided by the new line, and when it is extended to deep water as contemplated, we anticipate that a very much extended business will be done with other places. Such an extension, but a short distance, would materially increase the business of the Canada Eastern railway and be of vast benefit to Nelson and Newcastle as well as other places.
