THE ANGO-AMERICAN TRADE MARK TREATY.—A despatch dated Washington, Nov. 4th, says:—"The Trade Mark Treaty between the United States and Great Britain provides that subjects or citizens of each country have each the same right as subjects or citizens of the other, or as are now or may hereafter be granted to the subjects or citizens of the most favored nation in everything relating to trade marks and trade labels."

GENERAL SKOBELOFF.—A letter to the Moscow Gazette alluding to the battle before Plevna, thus speaks of Gen. Skobeloff:—"I saw him just before he began the assault. He was dressed in a brand new uniform, had on a new snow-white cap, wore white kid gloves, and was mounted on a white horse. He looked just as if he were going to a ball! But in the storming of that redoubt almost his entire command was killed or wounded around him."

DRYMOON AND AETHEASKA.—The Toronto Globe says:—"The defeat of Mr. Laurier, the newly appointed Minister of Inland Revenue, is due to a variety of influences, the nature of which, to some extent, at all events, time will reveal. It is quite certain that a dead set was made upon the constituency by the Conservatives, with the determination to achieve success if, by any possibility, success could be secured. Money and whiskey were freely used."

TIDAL WAVE AND EARTHQUAKE IN SOUTH AMERICA.—A despatch dated New York Oct. 31st says:—"A serious tidal disturbance occurred at Esmeraldas and Buenaventura, on the west coast of Colombia, on the 11th. A shock of an earthquake was felt on the 13th next day. It is believed that a serious earthquake took place at the south and east, which is yet to be heard from."

The lessee is Mr. James Worthington president of the Hotel Syndicate, the terms being \$40,000 per annum for 10 years commencing July 1st, 1878. The manager will be Mr. Henry Southgate of the United States Hotel. The opening will take place about the 1st January and take the shape of a grand ball.

Russian Soldiers and their Tea. The Russian soldiers are said to live and fight almost wholly on tea. The Cossacks often carry it about in the shape of bricks, or rather tiles, which, before drinking, are soaked in sheep's blood and boiled in milk, with the addition of flour, butter, and salt, so as to constitute a kind of soup. The possession of the Russian for this beverage is simply astonishing. In the depth of winter he will empty twenty cups in succession, at nearly boiling point, until he perspires at every pore, and then in a state of intense excitement rush out, roll in the snow, get up, and go into the next similar place of entertainment. So with the army.
